The green light is probably one of the most important symbols in The Great Gatsby. Green is the color of hope and it first appears when Gatsby stares across the bay towards a green light at the end of a dock (21,8ff.). Later the reader finds out that this light stands on Daisy Buchanan's dock.

Connotation, Character, and Color Imagery in The Great Gatsby

About the text: The Great Gatsby is story about extravagance that takes place in the 1920s. However, in a world of money, there is an understanding that there is new money and old money, and the rivalry in richness and wealth is, on some level, peculiar to a modern audience. The world of Gatsby seems lavish, but it is no less human.
