Community-acquired pneumonia (CAP) is the most common cause of death in children worldwide, accounting for 15% of deaths in children younger than 5 years of age. (1)

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Nearly 1 in 500 children will be hospitalized for CAP, which creates a substantial economic burden. CAP is thus important to diagnose and appropriately treat.
