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English Civil War Timeline - History

Following the intervention of a powerful Scottish army and the defeat of the king's forces at Marston Moor in 1644, Charles lost control of the north of Britain. The following year, Charles was defeated by parliament's New Model Army at Naseby and it became clear that the Royalist cause was lost.

The English Civil War started in 1642 when Charles I raised his royal standard in Nottingham. The split between Charles and Parliament was such that neither side was willing to back down over the principles that they held and war was inevitable as a way in which all problems could be solved.

The English Civil War was a series of civil wars and political machinations between Parliamentarians and Royalists principally over the manner of England's governance. The first and second wars pitted the supporters of King Charles I against the supporters of the Long Parliament, while the third saw fighting between supporters of King Charles II and supporters of the Rump Parliament. The war ended with Parliamentary victory at the Battle of Worcester on 3 September 1651. The outcome of the war
