Vygotsky has developed a sociocultural approach to cognitive development. He developed his theories at around the same time as Jean Piaget was starting to develop his ideas (1920's and 30's), but he died at the age of 38, and so his theories are incomplete - although some of his writings are still being translated from Russian.

More importantly, Pavlov ' s interest in applying psychological insights to learning theory closely mirrors Vygotsky ' s. Who Were Vygotsky ' s Contemporaries? Vygotsky ' s brief life overlapped with that of notable psychologists such as Freud, Pavlov, William James, John Dewey, Wolfgang Kohler, and B.F. Skinner. However, Vygotsky ' s most notable contemporary was Jean Piaget .

Vygotsky ' s unfinished theory of child development  
While Piaget believed that a child builds a unique view of the world, Vygotsky suggested that others within a child ' s social circle influence their perspectives, values, and attitudes. Individuals are actively engaging within their learning environments, continuously analyzing the reactions of others and modifying their responses as they adopt or reject accepted standards as their own.

Child Development Theories: Lev Vygotsky  
The major theme of Vygotsky ' s theoretical framework is that social interaction plays a fundamental role in the development of cognition. Vygotsky (1978) states: " Every function in the child ' s cultural development appears twice: first, on the social level, and later, on the individual level; first, between people (interpsychological) and then inside the child (intrapsychological).

In the 1960s, Vygotsky's work was revived by a new group of psychologists studying developmental psychology. Dr. Jerome Bruner coined the term "scaffolding" and connected it to Vygotsky's work. Dr. Bruner and other psychologists began studying the use of ZPD in different educational contexts, and they found that encouraging students to tackle the most difficult tasks within their ZPD leads to ...

However, in Vygotsky's theory, parents are adjuvants to cognitive development; they have little direct effect and are not discussed at length. Only Bandura's (1986) social learning theory affords parents a substantial and direct role in their child's cognitive development (see also Rosenthal & Zimmerman, 1978).

Vygotsky ' s Concept of Scaffolding. Vygotsky ' s concept of scaffolding is closely related to the concept of the Zone of Proximal Development. Scaffolding refers to the temporary support given to a child by a More Knowledgeable Other that enables the child to perform a task until such time that the child can perform this task independently.
